Methodist pastor. He continued to serve the church after his release from prison. Dedicated and committed, with a strong spirit. An example and encouragement for the following generations.



The Methodist Church 1857 - 1946

The beginning of the Methodist Church in Bulgaria can be traced back to 1857.

American missionaries came to Bulgaria in the years of the Ottoman rule. They were not only clergy, but served also as teachers and educators. They contributed also to the Bulgarian National Revival.

Dr Albert Long held the first worship service in Bulgarian language on Christmas Eve 1859 in the city of V. Tarnovo. At the time the Orthodox Church was holding its services in Greek. People were eager to listen to the Word of God in a language they could understand. The missionaries translated the Bible into Bulgarian, thus putting an end to the language debate and establishing the literary Bulgarian language.

The first Annual Conference was held in Russe in the Fall of 1876, during the most difficult time after the crushing of the April uprising. In those difficult years towards the end of the Turkish dominion, there were 8 active churches.


A successful growth of the Methodist Church followed. There were 45 churches untill 1946.

The Methodist Church 1947 - 1990

With the establishment of the Communist regime the pastors were convicted and thrown in prison. Many churches were closed and later their buildings were taken away.

The Methodist Church was destroyed. The names of pastors from the distant past were entirely forgotten. Today they must come out of oblivion.





A long period of persecution and destruction of the Church followed.

Only 3 churches remained: Shumen, Russe, Hotantsa.

Faithful to their ministry in the Church were the following pastors:

Simeon Popov, Ilija Iliev, Georgi Nalbantski, Garo Altunian.

The elderly pastor Simeon Popov convened in March a meeting of the survived Methodists.





Bishop Bolleter reinstated the Bulgarian Conference at the Board of the United Methodist Churc. The Methodist Church came back to life and



"Zeltmission" (the Tent Mission) and of the partner churches.

For many years we have been successful in our mission by using the "Jesus" film. Such a presentation of the Gospel is still having an effect on people. The UMC-Bus and Tent Mission are well accepted.

People are ready to listen to our message.

We are eagerly preaching the Gospel to various groups outside the church: people in the street, in hospitals, two prisons.

Many people accepted the invitation which led to the restoration of some of the older congre-gation and the establishing of new ones.

Translations and Publications

For the last 50 years Christian literature was banned and persecuted in Bulgaria.

There was a great need for the distribution of the Bible in a contemporary language. There was lack of Hymnals and theological books.

One of the first tasks that we were facing was a new revision of the Bible.


That lasted for 10 years. The text was accepted by the rest of the Protestant churches and has been published by the Bible Society ever since the year 2000.

Within a short time Wesley's "Sermons" and "Notes on the New Testament" were translated as well as the Liturgy and the Discipline.

More than 40 theological books have been translated and published:

"On the Road with Christ", "Living Grace", Tsvetan Litov's Sermons – 3 volumes, Simeon Popov's Sermons – 2 volumes, numerous materials for small group studies, books on other relevant topics.

Various study materials were also published: "Steps of Faith", quarterly guide for Sunday School teachers, "Sunday Helper". Forty interesting DVD films were translated.






Social Activities

Immediately after 1990 many people who needed help came to our churches. We were distributing among them the humanitarian help of medications, foods, clothing that we had received.

"The Merciful Samaritan" Social Center - Shumen

UMC Weiblingen were the first to offer help. They were the ones to initiate the building of the Social Center in Shumen which consists of a canteen, a hospital and a home for elderly people.

The Center has already been functioning effectively for 10 years. Its self-support is increasing these last years.

Soup kitchen in Varna

In the beginning there were soup kitchens in some of the churches.

Each winter in Varna 150 poor people receive warm food.

The soup kitchen is sponsored by the partner church Tahn-Ruti, Switzerland.

The soup kitchen is run only by volunteers from the church.





"John Wesley" Children's Day Center - Dobrich

There are many orphanages in the country. There are very serious problems in the orphanages. The most worrying thing is that the children leave the orphanages with serious deformations in their psycheas well as in their character.

There is one more endangered group of children those that are coming from disfunctioning families.

Often both parents are far away and the children are left under the care of their grandparents.

Such children are often in the street, cause problems and the social services are forced to send them to orphanages.

Difficulties in our mission

After 1990 we made a good use of the opportunities to preach the Gospel. Communities were gathered in many places. Today many of them are established churches, but some did not make any progress.

The reason for all this is the lack of workers and material resources. The services were held by itinerant preachers. Sometimes, in the beginning, the enthusiasm of the evangelists and of the new converts exceeded our abilities. When the building project in Varna was suspended the efforts of the entire team were concentrated on preaching the Good News. 19 new congregations were established in the region during that period.

However, we were unable to provide salaries that would be sufficient to cover the modest needs of the preachers' families. It was especially difficult as far as the preachers from the minorities. We lost some of them though we had invested a lot in their training.

Difficulties in our mission

Sometimes it was too hard to maintain the cars and cover the expenses. However, the main reason was that we failed to encourage and train local lay-preachers and workers.

The common thing among those congregation was the fact that all of them had no buildings of their own. In our society having a building is a matter of acceptance and identity, while for the church members it is a matter of commitment and sacrifice.

Some of our communities were attracted by the big promises given by other churches: Burgas, Djulino, Varna-2.

Other congregations were reduced in number and were turned into house groups: Ressen, Strahilovo, Balchik, Provadija, Bozvelijsko, Staro selo, Dalgopol, Grozdevo, Trastenik, Umarevtsi, Pchelnik, Burgas-Armenian.

We have reached more than 50 places and we are convinced that good seeds have been planted there. We are simply the sowers, but Christ is the Master of harvest!

The Story of a Bell




This is the bell which was given to the new Methodist church in Varna by the Baltimore Annual Conference in 1892.

At that year, 15 years ago, Bulgaria got free from 500 years of Ottoman slavery.

The new Methodist church is the only stone building in this town and the bell tower is a symbol of brotherhood with Methodists from the other part
